



## Miles TD is now Miles TD TDU

Tracking is my favorite dog sport. It's also a good sport for puppies, so my youngster Miles, aka Waldenmark Nose for Fashion Qui Rit, and I started early and have been working diligently. Miles earned his TD title at the 2014 National in Ohio, and we'd been working hard to be ready for the TDX this year in Pennsylvania.

I felt we were ready for TDX, and we tried a few times - at Fossil Ridge Ranch, in Houston, and near Lake Texoma. We didn't pass. Something always came up, and TDX is not just about meeting the requirements, but also about overcoming whatever else comes up.

The heat was also getting to Miles. Because TDX tracks have to age at least 3 hours before running, and most are not the sort of track that can be laid in the dark, it was getting warm by the time we ran. On top of that, Miles probably puts too much enthusiasm into his tracking. Maybe he'll slow down some as he gets older, but now he doesn't slow down when he should.

And finally, while I felt Miles's tracking skills were good, he needed more focus for TDX. He apparently wasn't quite

ready for new environments - especially those with mice and geese and water hazards!

I have been working Miles all along with VST in mind as well as TDX. So we went back to working in parks, on both vegetative and non-vegetative surfaces. Parks are great for working distractions.

When I received the premium list for the Basset Hound Club of America Regional Tracking Test I considered entering the TDX, but feared that it would be just too hot on Easter Sunday. Then it occurred to me that I could enter the TDU (Tracking Dog Urban) test. The TDU is an "optional titling tracking test" that was introduced in 2014. It is similar to the



TD in length and track age, but has an intermediate article, requires that the track be 10% - 30% non-vegetative (but doesn't allow a turn on a non-vegetative surface), and allows the handler to be 10' behind the dog rather than 20' (I wouldn't go through a parking lot 20' behind my dog!). I felt that we had the skills required, that the intermediate article would be motivational, and that the track would be run earlier in the day (since it didn't have to age as long) and thus it would be cooler.

I really didn't expect to get into the test, since Miles's prior TD put him in the second tier for the draw, but we did. As it turned out, Easter Sunday was cool and rainy! Just getting to south Fort Worth for the draw at daybreak in the pouring rain was not much fun. We drew the third TDU track. The first two TDU's ran in the rain, but it had pretty much let up by the time we ran. Miles started well and did well until we reached the first non-vegetative surface - crossing a road on the diagonal near an intersection. Miles dithered a little, then dashed over to the stop sign and ate most of a chicken bone someone had left behind. I did manage to get some of it out of his mouth. I knew I couldn't throw it away, because he would run after it, so I put it in my pack and we went back to work.

He made it across the street, found the track, then charged hard down a slope towards a ditch (that was a little scary) to a sock in the middle of a grassy area. That was great - he was motivated and so was I after our experience at the road. He

## Watermark's Brave At Heart TD

It was with mixed emotion that I entered Gryff in his first AKC competition at Fossil Ridge Ranch. I was thrilled that we managed to pass our certifying track in time to Fed Ex his entry in before closing—thank you, Charlene, for stopping off in Waco! I was so excited to launch his competition career at a familiar place with friendly faces. And it was my return to dog sports after sitting on the sidelines for a few years, so I was more than ready to be back in the thick of things.

But...returning to FRR would be bittersweet. Sixteen months prior, along with my older Retrievers, EZ and Ranger, I had driven up to FRR to work the No-



vember 2013 Combined T/X Test. Ranger and I had taken DFWTC classes for the past two years, so I was happy to carry flags and be a cross track layer. At that time I was second on the list for an amazing litter of Labs—my first ever performance puppy—due to be born around New Year's Day, so I was looking forward to having three dogs in the house in a few months time.

I'm glad I didn't know that was our last overnight road trip together. About a month later I suddenly lost EZ to cancer of the spleen. She was 14, but it still took me by surprise—we had to let her go the same day she was diagnosed. A few days later I found out there was a problem with the Lab breeding and, although the bitch was fine, there would be no puppies. And six months after that I lost 13-year-old Ranger almost as suddenly as EZ to an aggressive form of pancreatic cancer.

Needless to say, I don't remember much for the three months that followed, not until Gryff came home with



me in September 2014. Over a year of looking and I had failed to get a puppy from three prior litters, but 4th time was the charm; he was the right dog at the right time. I had never trained a puppy to track before but Gryff was a natural. He didn't get his tracking harness until Christmas and now I'm kicking myself for not buying him a puppy harness sooner—he turned corners on rails and at speed. I actually thought he was ready for certification in late January, but literally the day after I emailed Charlene to set a date, he woke up an air scenting dog-

woohoo! (Not.) It took another month to "fix" that issue, and Charlene did some much-needed psychological work on me to boot. When we passed our Cert Track on the first attempt it was a new milestone for each of us!

Now I had to stay calm for two more weeks. I was nervous about our first ever test and Gryff's first overnight motel stay. We had to find an ATV to make sure Gryff would ride in it (he would). It didn't help that north Texas got a crazy 5-6 inches of snow the week before and I discovered Gryff was a wimp when it came to performing his "down" indication in the cold and wet. Almost every bite he ate that week had to be earned by "downing" at an article either indoors or out—I know, overkill.

Test day was cold, crisp and clear and all the snow had melted—ideal conditions for Gryff—yes! With only two TD entries and the other a bitch in heat, we automatically drew the first track, which was great because my stomach was just ready to get it all over with. An old friend living in the area who I hadn't seen since college made it in, and she even got a seat on one of the ATVs to come out and watch our track.

The track itself plays back in my head like a dream. As soon as I gave the "find it" command, Gryff put his nose down and took off, pulling me along like a kite. I'm not normally a psychic, otherworldly person, but from

my first step I felt the strong presence of Ranger riding at my right shoulder and EZ at my left, with mighty Gryffindor effortlessly dragging all three of us, all his focus forward. My vision narrowed to just the track and my dog; the only sound I heard was my own breath.

Six minutes, 490 yards and four turns later, Gryff stopped and immediately laid down. I remember running up, seeing the glove and jumping up and down and hugging him. Other than a quick check in the wrong direction on the first turn, he had been dead on the



track the whole time. It was like I had been an assistant in a really cool Vegas magic show. Good Dog!!

Gryffindor wins the House Cup!!! At seven-and-a-half months of age, Gryff became the first TD in the family. It was the six month anniversary of the day I had brought him home. He was the first dog in his litter of seven performance pups to title. Granted, none of the others track, but I was still over the moon!

TDX and VST are both definitely in our future. Practicing takes more time to set up and we have more variables to train. But I'm learning to be a smarter track layer, and to love handing over the control to Gryff as much as he loves taking it. He will be a multi-sport dog, but watching him track is so fascinatingly different from anything else we do. I plan for tracking to be a regular part of Gryff's life for many years to come.

continued on, made a turn to go behind a building, crossed over a sidewalk and went over to check out the edge of a buried utility closet next to the building. I was worried that he was varminting (although his tail wasn't going fast and furiously). Maybe something about the rat traps on either side of the utility closet made me think of that. It seemed like an eternity - we worked our way almost out of the area several times, but then he would come back to the utility closet. Once I pulled out the start article to re-scent him, but the chicken bone remains flew out with it - so we had that discussion again. Finally he went on, crossed another sidewalk, found his track and made another turn to the very soggy glove. He and I were both excited to see that glove, and Miles was now **Waldenmark Nose for Fashion Qui Rit TD TDU**.

I do wish Miles and I could have a discussion about that track. I really didn't see in him what I was used to seeing on the

hard surface work. We had not worked around buildings much at all. In fact, I was a bit surprised to see how much there was. We also had not worked non-vegetative surfaces in the rain, and it had rained hard - my final glove was still soggy the next day. In retrospect, I wonder if the run-off might have confused him. And we had not really worked tracks that were that "hot" - especially combined with the cool weather. I was glad we had entered, and pleased that both of us were able to deal with "whatever came up" on that day.
